


I am born in an NHS hospital. My mother loses pints of blood. We both survive. We might not have, back in that basement flat in Paddington.






The Rise of The Meritocracy is published.

He says: "If it's the last thing I do, I'm going to destroy every fucking grammar school in England. And Wales and Northern Ireland."






I leave junior school, and join the first year of a brand new comprehensive: Whitchurch High School.

Had I been a year older, I would have had to take the 11+, and might have gone to Whitchurch Grammar School or Whitchurch Secondary School.

The new school proved tremendous. It helped me to get into university. It later nurtured Gareth Bale and Sam Warburton on their way to stardom.





Labour government launches Open University. Michael Young had the vision for a university open to all.

PM Harold Wilson later described it as his most proud achievement. It later gave my mother the chance for education she had been denied.





BBC runs low-budget school quiz called "What's It All About". For what we would now call "diversity", they included a comprehensive: Whitchurch High School.

All the other teams we faced were grammar and private schools.






I am the first member of my family to go to university.

I've now been reading it for half a century.






I join the Boston Consulting Group, which proudly called itself a meritocracy.





I graduate from Stanford University Graduate School of business. We love the information age. We all praise meritocracy.



Two decades later he was Head of the Audit Committee on the board of Enron as it collapsed.

For the first time I march in the LGBT Pride parade.






Labour government elected with PM Tony Blair declaring "I want a society based on meritocracy."






Use of the word "meritocracy" reaches new high.






My mother graduates from the Open University, receiving her degree from Bessie Braddock, a politician she had always admired.

Facebook launched.








The Rise and Rise of Meritocracy published and ponders a paradox:

"The story (The Rise of the Meritocracy) was intended to help turn Labour away from meritocracy, by reminding it of the importance of communitarian values.


Curiously though, half a century later we have a Labour government declaring the promotion of meritocracy as one of its primary objectives."






I finally read The Rise of The Meritocracy. I ponder:

"Am I a meritocrat, or am I not a meritocrat?"





Chris Hayes publishes Twilight of The Elites: America After Meritocracy. He asks whether meritocracy is a Good Thing, as both Barack Obama and Mitt Romney say, or is it a Bad Thing, as Michael had predicted. He finds that most of Michael's predictions had come true, at least in the US. The new "meritocratic" elite has made itself rich and has hardened to outsiders. Social mobility has gone down, with the help of the education system. Colleges and universities have more and more students who are children of alumni or the well-off. Admission tests, such as SAT, correlate better to "background" than college grades or lifetime achievement. Meritocracy is now inheritable.






Equal marriage becomes law in the UK, the US, and the US, and in France, all in the same year.

Populist revolts.

Meritocrats say that the populists are revolting.





The power of attention defeats the power of the meritocracy.

Worldwide movement to unmask men that abuse women claims some impressive scalps, including Damian Green, Deputy PM, and Harvey Weinstein, Hollywood mogul. Respect became cool.





The age of attention brings down another meritocrat.

Ironically, it's Michael Young's son, Toby.

He resigned as Director of the government Office for Students after a firestorm of protest about past tweets and his involvement with "progressive eugenics". "Unlike my father, I'm not an egalitarian". "I think the answer is more meritocracy. I approve of the principle for the same reason my father disapproved of it, because it helps to secure people's consent to… inequalities."





Failure of meritocracies commands attention.

Two organisations proud to call themselves "meritocracies" create chaos, in full view. The UK Civil Service and EU Commission get lost in detail.

Brexit rolls into chaos.

Meritocrats blame the people.





Corbyn & Trump win elections on platform of peace and prosperity. They offer good relations with Russia and China, withdrawal from NATO, and no involvement in the middle east, in particular with Israel / Iran. They call for British / American jobs and pulling out of the EU / NAFTA. Corbyn & Trump dismiss any accusations of anti-semitism / racism and shady connections with terrorists / mafia as smears.

Javid & Sanders campaign for diversity and inclusion, and staying in the EU / NAFTA. They have the support of all traditional media.





#AllVotesMatter goes viral after widespread revelations of electoral bad practice in the UK and US: some fraud, a lot of voter suppression, and poorly kept electoral rolls. Movement grows to question first past the post, the Presidential college, and more. Comprehensive list of electoral reforms gain popularity: limits on campaign spending, tracking of all sources of political information, exclusion of foreign participation, automatic registration of voters, voter rolls linked to tax and citizenship records, compulsory voting, free transport to polling stations, and the option of voting online. Straight friends shrug and ask "why bother?"






Parents implant digital chips into children.
